He angered George Washington by refusing to serve in the Continental Congress. However, he was the primary author of Virginia Declaration of Rights in 1776. As a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, he was one of three delegates to vote against the Constitution and led ratification opposition, insisting on a Bill of Rights.
